When you are beginning something new, you can't always see where you're headed with it. You have to be okay with not knowing exactly how things will turn out. In knitting, you cast on your first stitch and follow a chart – a series of letters and numbers that to a non-knitter might appear cryptic and unreadable. The chart tells you which stitch to lay down in what order, but it takes a while before you can see anything adding up – before the pattern itself becomes visible in the yarn. We will welcome the Rev. Molly Smothers to deliver the message on Sunday, August 6. Rev. Smothers is the Associate Regional Minister for Kentucky. Her position includes congregational development, Committee on Ministry, facilitating Districts 5 and 6, and planning the 2024 Regional Assembly. Rev. Smothers is from Lexington and graduated from Transylvania University with degrees in Philosophy and Humanities. She has a Master of Divinity degree from Lexington Theological Seminary, where she was awarded the Welch Award for New Testament Studies. She has completed all classwork necessary for the Doctor of Divinity degree.

Rev. Smothers has served as Senior Minister with congregations in Cynthiana (1995-2000), Mount Sterling (2000-2004), and Morehead (2004-2015). In June 2015, she moved from full-time ministry to serve in interim capacities, including churches in Independence, Owensboro, Georgetown, Maysville, Harrodsburg, and most recently in Flemingsburg.

Within the denomination, Rev. Smothers has taught several classes on Homiletics for the Commission on Ministry School, served for years on the Committee on Ministry, and has been an officer in local ministerial associations. She has led workshops for Disciples Women's Fellowship, Regional Assembly, and with many other congregations.

She has served on the board of the Morehead public radio station (WMKY), worked with ALLYance on the MSU campus and Morehead Fairness, and has worked in regional theater.

Rev. Smothers is married to Leon Smothers, who is retired from state government after a long career with the Division of Water; he has served on the board of many national organizations dealing with water and conservation. They recently moved from a 24-acre farm in Rowan County to Danville. They have three adult children and three grandchildren.

How Climate Change is Making Us Sick

People around the world are living longer, healthier lives than they were just half a century ago. Climate change threatens to undo that progress.

Across the planet, animals — and the diseases they carry — are shifting to accommodate a globe on the fritz. And they're not alone: Ticks, mosquitos, bacteria, algae, even fungi are on the move, shifting or expanding their historical ranges to adapt for climatic conditions that are changing at an extraordinary pace.

Deforestation, mining, agriculture, and urban sprawl are taking bites out of the globe's remaining wild areas, contributing to biodiversity loss that's occurring at a <u>rate unprecedented in human history</u>. Populations of species that <u>humans rely on for sustenance</u> are dwindling and getting pushed into ever-smaller slices of habitat, creating new hotspots for diseases to jump from animals to humans.

Meanwhile, the number of people experiencing extreme repercussions of a warming planet continues to grow. Climate change <u>displaces some 20 million every year</u> — people who need housing, medical care, food, and other essentials that strain already fragile systems that are growing ever more stressed.

All of these factors create conditions ripe for human illness. Diseases old and new are becoming more prevalent and even cropping up in places they've never been found before.

"This is not just something off in the future," Neil Vora, a physician with the nonprofit Conservation International, said. "Climate change is here. People are suffering and dying right now." Research shows that climate change <u>influences the spread of disease</u> in a few major ways.

To escape rising temperatures in their native ranges, animals are <u>beginning to move to higher, cooler</u> <u>elevations</u>, bringing diseases with them. That poses a threat to people living in those areas, and it also leads to dangerous intermingling between animal newcomers and existing species.

Erratic weather patterns, such as periods of extreme drought and flooding, <u>create conditions for diseases to</u> <u>spread</u>. Cases of cholera, a water-borne bacterial disease, <u>skyrocket during the monsoon season</u> in South Asian countries. Valley fever, a fungal-borne infection caused by spores that grow in the soil in the western U.S., proliferates during periods of rain.

Cases of disease linked to mosquitos, ticks, and fleas <u>tripled</u> in the U.S. between 2004 and 2016, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. <u>Research shows</u> more than half of all the pathogens known to cause disease in humans can be made worse by climate change. The World Health Organization <u>estimates</u> that, between 2030 and 2050, just a handful of climate-related threats, such as malaria and water insecurity, will claim a quarter of a million additional lives each year.

The world has the tools it needs — wildlife-surveillance networks, vaccines, early-warning systems — to mitigate the impacts of climate-driven disease. Some of these tools have already been tried on a local scale to great effect. What remains to be seen is how quickly governments, NGOs, medical providers, doctors, and the public can work across borders to develop and deploy a global plan of action.

Kentucky author's Pulitzer-winning novel is the BCC book club's August selection

The BCC book club will revisit a favorite author when we read "Demon Copperhead," the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel by native Kentuckian Barbara Kingsolver, as our August book.

Described as a reimagining of the Charles Dickens classic "David Copperfield," "Demon Copperhead" is the story of a boy in Appalachian southwest Virginia, born to a teenage single mother in a single-wide trailer, navigating a world of poverty, drug abuse, and a broken foster care system, armed only with his caustic wit and his indomitable will to survive.

A native of Nicholas County, Kingsolver is the author of numerous novels, including "The Poisonwood Bible," which was our first selection when the BCC book club launched in 2012. Kingsolver is the subject of a profile in the August issue of Kentucky Monthly magazine.

The recovery working group is working on scheduling a meeting in mid-August to discuss next steps.


