Well, June was quite a month in the life of our church. On June 13, we suffered a fire in the back of the church building. No one was in the building when the fire occurred, and firefighters were there as quickly as possible to make sure that the fire was out and that the church was safe. We are so blessed because so many people and organizations have contacted us with their willingness to help in whatever way they can.

Friends, we are at the very beginning of the recovery process for our church building. There are many things that we will have to do as we move forward and do everything we can to get back into the building quickly and safely. But, as I write this today, there are three things I want to tell you.

First, it is okay to grieve. Our church building has so much history – both history in the community and personal history. What has happened is scary. We have lost things that have meaning to us from fire, smoke, and water damage, some of which we aren't even aware of yet. So, allow yourself to grieve. It is okay to cry. Hug those you love in your family and in the congregation and tell stories of memories from the building.

Second, we must have patience. As you

have seen from the updates we are sending out, this is not a quick or easy process that we are going through. There are a lot of moving parts and sometimes we will move quickly and sometimes we will have to wait. But, we will recover from this fire. This is not the first fire our congregation has experienced, even if it is the first fire we have experienced in this iteration of the congregation. We have been the church at Bridgeport since 1846 and we will continue to be that presence in the community.

Third, I want you all to remember that the church is not a building – the church is made up of the body of Christ. Whether we are worshipping in our sanctuary, at The Evergreen Southern Kitchen and Gathering Place, or at home on our couches, we are still the body of Christ, and we are still Bridgeport Christian Church. Our life and ministry does not end simply because we cannot be in the building. We will continue to do ministry – just in July, we have a gathering at Juniper Hill Aquatic Center with First Christian, Lawrenceburg; Vacation Bible School at the Education Annex (formerly the youth house); and an all-church picnic at Salato Wild Life Education Center (the Game Farm). We will meet on Zoom, and at The Evergreen, and at the Education Annex. We will do whatever we need to do to continue to live out the call that God has placed on us individually and as a church.

Friends, God is with us in the midst of this trial. Once again, we are reminded in Isaiah that God brings beauty from ashes, strength from fear, gladness from mourning, and peace from despair. And these are all emotions that we will feel as we recover. But God is holding us and God is caring for us and God is lifting us up.

So, hold each other in prayer. Hold our church in prayer. Hold yourself in prayer. Let yourself feel the feelings that you need to feel. And know that God is with you and that I am with you too. Fire Update

Bridgeport Christian Church is recovering from the June 13 fire and continues to hold Sunday worship services and special events. Here is what we know and what's happening at this writing:

- BioSweep, an odor removal business recommended by GuideOne Insurance, has completed the odor removal process.
- ServiceMaster of Louisville is scheduled to begin cleanup on July 3. The cleanup process is expected to take several weeks.
- Engineering consultants from In-Line Consulting & Engineering Services came to BCC on June 21 and spent several hours studying the fire damage.
- A recovery working group, led by Property Committee Chairperson Casey Hayden, formed the day after the fire to manage the recovery process and inform the congregation about steps being taken to recover from the fire while continuing regular church activities, including Sunday worship. The recovery working group consists of Diane Dominick, Casey Hayden, Larry Hayden, Jeff Pratt, Becky Ramsey, Allan Robertson, Pastor Ann Shepherd, Ted Sloan, and Tom Watts.
- BCC will hold Sunday morning worship services at The Evergreen Southern Kitchen, 400 Evergreen Road, till further notice. Shortly after the fire, the proprietors of The Evergreen generously offered the use of their facility for as long as we need it. We also received offers of assistance from several churches in Franklin County.
- Along with Sunday morning worship, BCC will hold regular and special activities as scheduled, including Vacation Bible School, book club, and an all-church picnic in July. See items elsewhere in The Bridge.
- If anyone needs to get into the church building, please contact Casey Hayden or Pastor Ann.

Please keep our beloved church in your prayers, and please continue your support of the work of the church. We will continue to serve our congregation and the community while the recovery and repairs are in progress. Thank you for your support, your patience, and your devotion to Bridgeport Christian Church.



Green News

This month's Green News will focus on the ocean. After all, the ocean is a summertime favorite for many vacationers. It's important that we understand the complexities of our oceans and their importance to life on planet Earth. The following information is provided by Blessed Tomorrow, the faith arm of ecoAmerica in partnership with Creation Justice Ministries.

Our Ocean: Changing Climate, Shifting Tides

What You Need to Know

The ocean is part of God's creation and is central to stabilizing the earth's climate. We are called to enjoy, protect, and care for the ocean as a sacred gift from God.

A healthy ocean is essential to every living thing on Earth. It covers 71% of the earth, creating 50% of the earth's oxygen and absorbing more than 25% of the carbon dioxide.

A healthy ocean is humankind's most effective ally against climate change. The ocean absorbs the majority of the excess heat generated by pollution, distributing the heat through ocean currents to help stabilize the climate.

A healthy ocean provides a lot of food and is important to our economy. Changing ocean temperatures and overfishing have impacted fish quality and populations, and the jobs and businesses connected to the sea.

Climate change harms the ocean. Increasing pollution causes acidification and warming temperatures, which harm coral reefs, increase the growth of harmful algae, and force migration of marine life, impacting entire ecosystems.

Intensifying hurricanes and sea level rise due to the warming ocean and melting glaciers <u>impact billions of people</u> (including 40% of Americans) and island and coastal cultures.

Pollution damages the ocean: 80% of ocean pollutants come from the land – including trash (90% are plastics), oil, pathogens in sewage, fertilizers, pesticides, toxic industrial wastes, and sediments. Runoff contaminates our coastal waters and harms marine life.

Holy scriptures teach and religious traditions remind us that life was created in the waters. Protecting and caring for the ocean is an expression of reverence for the cradle of life.

What You Need to Do

The ocean is vital for our human communities, is important for vast and interconnected ecosystems, and is integrated into our distinct faith traditions and common histories. While we may live hundreds of miles from the ocean, our life choices impact the health of the ocean and all marine life. One the most important things we can do is to talk with others about the ocean's connection to our health and the climate. You can start today.

Talk about and advocate for the ocean in your congregation and community, on social media, and in sign-on letters. Encourage elected officials to support legislation that maintains and protects the ocean.

Invite your congregation and community to learn more using resources like this page and Creation Justice Ministries' Ocean page.

Enjoy the ocean responsibly. Clean up trash, respect wildlife and signage, and leave spaces better than you found them. Purchase fish that are sustainably caught or harvested.

Protect all our waterways for a healthier ocean. Dispose of trash properly, encourage plastic-free options, and limit single-use plastics. Limit the use of chemicals on lawns and gardens. Look for alternatives to conventional herbicides and pesticides.
Reduce your energy consumption. Save money by saving energy. When possible, purchase electric cars and heat pumps, and source electricity from solar, wind, and geothermal to transition away from burning fuels that pollute our air and water.


Get involved in hands-on ocean justice work at sites like Blue Theology mission stations. Visit a coastal community to learn more about care for the ocean.
