Membership Committee Meeting:


Membership committee will meet on Zoom Thursday, January 5, at 6:00pm. If you want to join us, contact Donna Long and she will get the Zoom information for you.

Let's Welcome 2023 with a Climate Justice Commitment

"It is becoming more and more apparent that a growing climate crisis causes significant suffering for God's children." This quote by Rev. Vy Nguyen, Week of Compassion Executive Director, appeared in the December 2021 Bridge article "Climate Change Affects Week of Compassion."

Over the last decade, natural disasters have increased in frequency and intensity – wildfires, drought, hurricanes, to made and flooding. The devastation they bring forever impacts families and communities.

Kentucky has been, and continues to be, impacted by severe weather. In December 2021, western Kentucky was in the path of tornados that ravaged the South and Midwest. Never in the history of the state had tornados left a path of destruction as far-reaching and deadly. A year later, residents continue to recover and rebuild from the estimated \$2.9 billion loss as they mourn the 80 lives lost on that fateful December day.


In the summer of 2022, torrential rains resulted in a 1,000-year flood event in eastern Kentucky. Homes were swept away, basic infrastructure (electricity and water) was destroyed, and 43 lives were lost. Today, residents are still cleaning up, and many survivors are living in temporary housing. Cost estimates to repair and rebuild are in the hundreds of millions of dollars and rising.

With rising global temperatures and a warming climate, the future will undoubtably bring more natural disasters of the same or greater magnitude. So why are temperatures rising and the climate warming?

One reason is the natural processes of time and space, heating, and cooling – God's design of the universe. But, we humans have contributed to the recent rapid increase, which began with the Industrial Revolution of the 1850s. Our dependence on fossil fuels (coal, oil, and gas) has generated and released significant amounts of carbon dioxide and methane gas into the atmosphere. These atmospheric gases act as a greenhouse, trapping the sun's heat and preventing it from escaping. Thus, the rise in earth's temperature, resulting in warmer oceans, melting glaciers, and rising sea levels. The imbalance in ocean temperatures and atmospheric conditions sets the stage for the unprecedented natural disasters we are experiencing.

So what can we do? As Christians, we must let our faith and spiritual paths guide us to care for creation by living simply, avoiding waste, and loving our neighbors, especially the most vulnerable, who are most affected by disasters.

So let's start 2023 by committing to climate justice and a low-carbon New Year. You can begin by calculating your carbon footprint. Visit <u>coolclimate.berkeley.edu</u> for an online calculator to enter your information on travel, home, food, and shopping. The calculator will show your results and direct you to areas that make the biggest impact to reduce your carbon footprint – transportation, diet, and home energy use. Look for more information in future issues of The Bridge. Until then, let's face the climate crisis head-on by committing to do our part to reduce our carbon footprint. After all, God put His trust in us to care for creation and to love our neighbors. Have a Blessed New Year!
