What you need to know about Solar Energy: A summary of Lunch and Learn, May 21

Some 25 people attended our first Lunch and Learn since COVID to hear about Solarize Frankfort and the benefits of solar power. Andy McDonald with Apogee Environmental and a member of Solarize Frankfort, and Kevin Anderson, an installer with Pure Power Solar, presented and answered many questions. A summary follows.

Did you know that solar energy is the cheapest source of power?

That's because it comes from the sun – a clean and renewable resource. Solar panels are guaranteed for 25+ years and last 30-50 years. They are low maintenance and increase property values. The cost is limited to the materials and installation (no battery needed).

Over the last 10 years, prices for solar energy have fallen 74 percent. In Kentucky, enough solar has been installed to power 6,800 homes, creating nearly 1,500 jobs in the solar energy industry. By 2026, the \$165 million investment in solar energy in Kentucky will power 127,520 homes.

Did you know that federal tax credits and installation discounts are available to residences and businesses? A 30 percent federal tax credit is available until 2032. This means that, if a solar array costs \$15,000, a \$4,500 tax credit will be deducted, leaving a total cost of \$10,500. But tax credits are only one discount available. Through Solarize Frankfort, installers offer wholesale, discounted rates of up to 15 percent off in addition to the federal tax credit. Discounted rates apply to houses of worship and other non-profits as well. Other discounts may be available through the Inflation Reduction Act. Grants are available through the Green Chalice Ministry and other organizations.

Another advantage of owning your solar power generation is locking in your electric rate for 25 years instead of just buying electricity from the utility company at the current market rate. For example, if the net cost of a solar array is \$14,085, and it produces 209,521 kilowatt hours (kWh) of energy over 25 years, the average cost per kWh is 6.8 cents. The current cost of energy from the grid is 10 cents per kWh and in 25 years is projected to cost 20 cents per kWh. So a savings of 35 percent over the current utility rate will become a savings of 67 percent in 25 years.

What is Solarize Frankfort? It is a community effort to bring affordable solar to Frankfort and Franklin County and all adjacent counties. The City of Frankfort has partnered with the Kentucky Solar Energy Society and other local organizations to help residents, small businesses, houses of worship, and non-profits reduce their energy costs. Two solar installers were selected after an extensive vetting process – Pure Power Solar from Louisville and Wilderness Trace Solar from Danville. The installers do not subcontract and are solely responsible for the entire installation.

Whether your electric power is provided by the Frankfort Electric and Water Plant Board (FEWPB), Kentucky Utilities, Blue Grass Energy, or another power source, you can enjoy a savings by using solar power and in most cases receive a credit valued at the cost of production for excess electricity generated by your solar array and returned to the grid.

Keep in mind that utility rates are regulated by the Public Service Commission (PSC) with the exception of municipal/publicly-owned utilities such as the Plant Board. Utilities may change the rates they will credit for solar power generated by residential and business customers and channeled into the grid (subject to approval by the PSC in the case of utilities regulated by the commission). Current Kentucky law protects existing solar power systems from changes in the law. The Kentucky General Assembly may amend state laws governing solar energy any time it is in session.




