

On July 29-August 1, I was blessed to be able to attend the General Assembly of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada, this time hosted in Louisville. Kirk Shepherd, Annette Hayden, Betty Martin, and my children also attended. It was an absolute blessing from beginning to end, as we worshipped together, attended workshops and programs, and did the business of the church.

The business is what I want to update you all on today. We had six Sense-of-the-Assembly resolutions (one of which you can read about in Green News). I want to tell you about two of the resolutions.

One resolution was titled "Calling the Church to Oppose Christian Nationalism." Christianity Today says, "Christian nationalism is the belief that the American nation is defined by Christianity, and that the government should take active steps to keep it that way. Popularly, Christian nationalists assert that America is and must remain a 'Christian nation' – not merely as an observation about American history, but as a prescriptive program for what America must continue to be in the future." Also, according to the resolution, "Christian Nationalism

misrepresents our faith to our neighbors, thereby, turning people away from the life-giving love of God, by identifying Christianity with hate, social hierarchy, fear of the 'other,' and violence." Christian Nationalism promotes division and is counter to the heart of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in our call for unity and welcome at the Lord's Table. This resolution called for our denomination to oppose Christian Nationalism, educate ourselves about Christian Nationalism and its dangers, and speak out against it. 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Another resolution that was discussed and passed, with no dissenting votes, was called "Invitation to Oppose Anti-Trans Legislation and Affirm the Dignity of Transgender and Gender-Diverse People." According to translegislation.com, across the United States, 83 anti-trans bills have passed this year so far, including two in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This resolution states that, as a denomination, we "reaffirm the historic commitment of this movement to recognize and affirm the sacred dignity of all peoples as all are made in the sacred image of God and deserving of respect and honor." The resolution called on our denomination, ministers, ministries, and members to stand up against this kind of harm and to become "safe spaces" for those who are gender-diverse and transgender. ### **Recovery Update**

Bridgeport Christian Church Family,

On Aug. 21, the Administrative Board authorized Property Chairperson Casey Hayden to sign a contract on behalf of the church for ServiceMaster of Louisville to perform the repairs to the damage from the June 13 fire. This is the same company that has been cleaning up the fire damage and storing items in preparation for the repairs.

ServiceMaster estimates that the sanctuary could be ready for us to worship there as early as mid-January, and their work on the rest of the church will be complete by mid-summer 2024. We should point out that any estimated timeline is just that – an estimate – and, as with any structure that has existed for several decades, it is reasonable to expect that they will run into the unexpected as they work. We appreciate your understanding and your patience.



### **Green News**

On July 29, Betty Martin, Pastor Ann and Kirk Shepherd, and I, along with more than 3,000 other Disciples, participated in the passage of Resolution GA2338 "Concerning Food Waste, Food Insecurity, and Environmental Justice." Food waste has been on BCC's Green Team radar for quite some time. You may remember that our youth presented a program last year on Earth Stewardship Sunday.

So why would Disciples present this resolution? Let's look at the background information that supports it. "Climate change affects all of us, but especially the poorest and most vulnerable. Climate change negatively affects agriculture and fisheries by decreasing food harvests, causing greater food insecurity and loss of food worker livelihoods; climate impacts on food systems are projected to increase occurrences of malnutrition and diet-related mortality.

"Remarkably, rich countries in North America and Europe waste as much food as sub-Saharan Africa produces, a clear example of squandering the Earth's resources without regard for those who are hungry.

Thirty to forty percent of all food produced in the United States is wasted.

"Food waste accounts for about a quarter of the trash sent to landfills and generates the same amount of greenhouse gas emissions as 32.6 million cars. Methane, a greenhouse gas emitted in landfills as food decomposes, is 80 times more powerful than carbon dioxide when it comes to trapping heat in the Earth's atmosphere.

"Beef production produces more than five times the amount of greenhouse gas (methane) emissions per serving as poultry.

"Many cities in the United States have demonstrated the ability to dramatically decrease greenhouse gas emissions in landfills by providing city-wide composting programs. Working with local governments to create affordable composting programs is a faithful response to our role as stewards who till and keep the garden."

Through this resolution, congregations are urged to:

- •Compost food scraps and coffee grounds rather than throwing them away;
  - •Create a plan to share leftover food following church dinners;
- Encourage serving plant-based foods rather than meats at potluck dinners;
  - Serve water from refillable pitchers;
- •Eliminate the purchase of disposable plates, cups, utensils, napkins, and tablecloths;
  - •Create a culture of dishwashing as a spiritual practice and time of fellowship;
    - Convert church lawns into community vegetable gardens;
    - Provide space for local farmers markets and food distribution centers;
      - Utilize established resources provided by Green Chalice; and
- •Work faithfully with local governments to create affordable composting programs in our neighborhoods.

  Individuals are urged to:
  - •Compost food scraps and coffee grounds rather than sending them to the landfill;
    - Purchase and prepare only the amount of food needed;
    - •Manage food storage by eating foods before they are no longer edible;
      - Bring home leftovers from restaurant meals;
  - •Replace one beef meal per week with poultry, fish, legumes, vegetables, or pasta; and •Utilize established resources provided by Green Chalice.

The story of "the least of these" in Matthew 25 teaches us to feed all who are hungry in the same way that we would readily feed Jesus. Our actions make a difference. By taking care of the Garden, we care for the "least of these."


